YEAR IN REVIEW

2020 was a significant year for ORCID in Australia. As the world came to grips with COVID-19, the Australian Access Federation (AAF) as the ORCID Consortium Lead continued to support members as operations evolved. I would like to take this moment to thank the community for their invaluable support during this unprecedented time.

The Australian Nuclear Science Technology Organisation (ANSTO) joined the Consortium in 2020, bringing the total number of members to 42. There are now over 152 000 Australia-related ORCID IDs registered (based on email address), which is four times greater than when the Consortium commenced in 2016. This increase highlights the exceptional growth of ORCID in Australia and the tremendous community effort.

Throughout the year, the AAF with the support of the members undertook a national maturity assessment of ORCID deployments in Australia. This assessment was the first of its kind for any ORCID Consortium worldwide. It aimed to highlight areas where members are excelling and where advancements are needed for an organisation. Phase one of this exercise was completed in 2020. Phase two analysis is planned for 2021. The AAF and two member organisations also took part in the ORCID Member Portal pilot program. This provided an opportunity to be directly involved in the development of the service prior to global release.

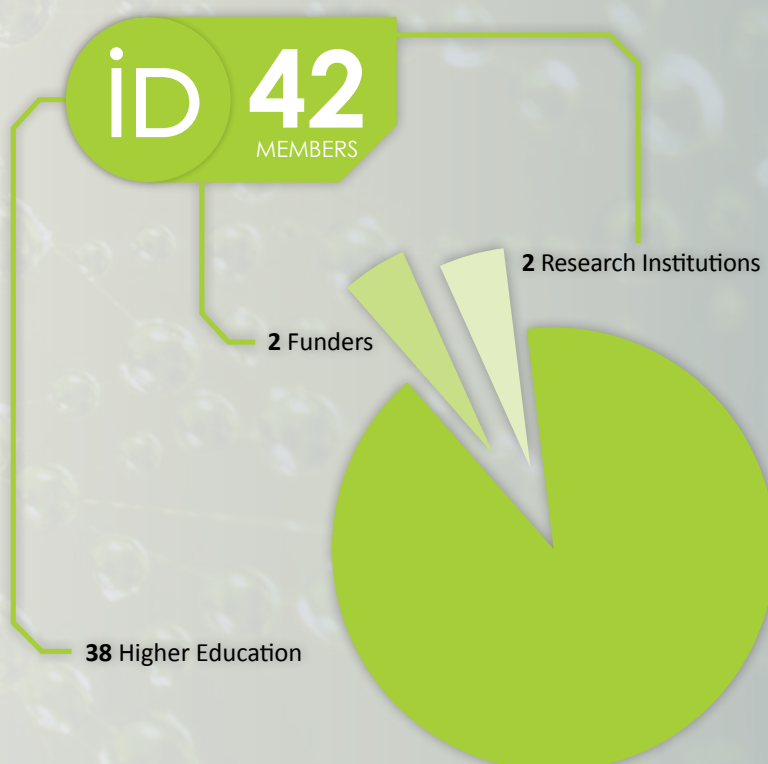
There are now 35 members who have implemented an ORCID integration and several members who have undertaken multiple integrations. The AAF is working closely with the remaining seven members to support integration planning. Communication and engagement have played a key part in the AAF's role. 2020 saw the development of innovative online engagement strategies with activities, including Community Calls, which proved to be effective in sharing knowledge with members.

The AAF continues to play an important role in setting the national agenda for persistent identifiers and as such worked closely throughout the year with the ORCID Governance Committee and Advisory Group to develop 'Vision 2023'. Importantly this vision document provides aspirations and measures for the AAF and members to enhance national reporting and interoperability for future research.

The AAF would like to thank the ORCID Advisory Group and Governance Committee for their ongoing support during 2020 and looks forward to continuing to advance the next exciting phase of the Australian ORCID agenda.

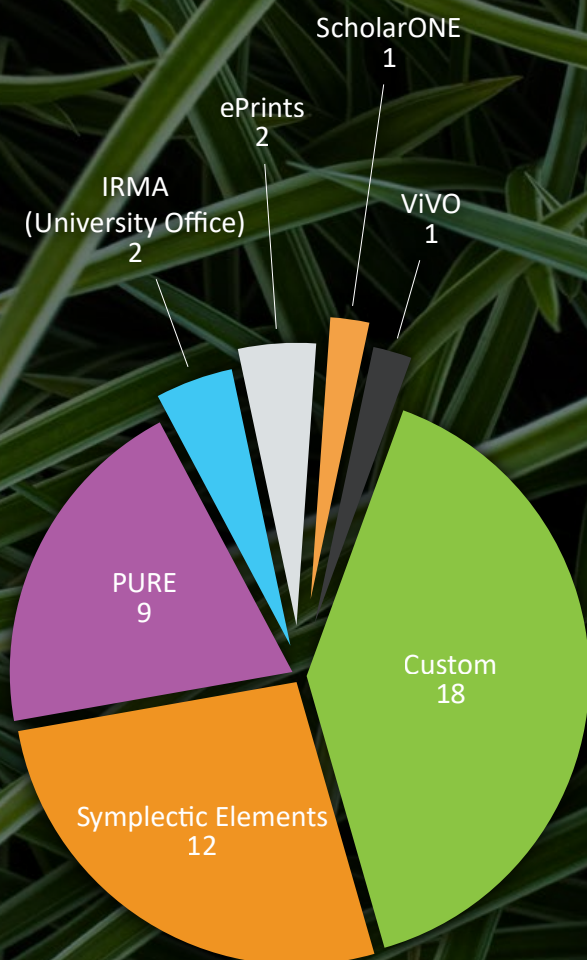

MEMBER INTEGRATIONS 2020

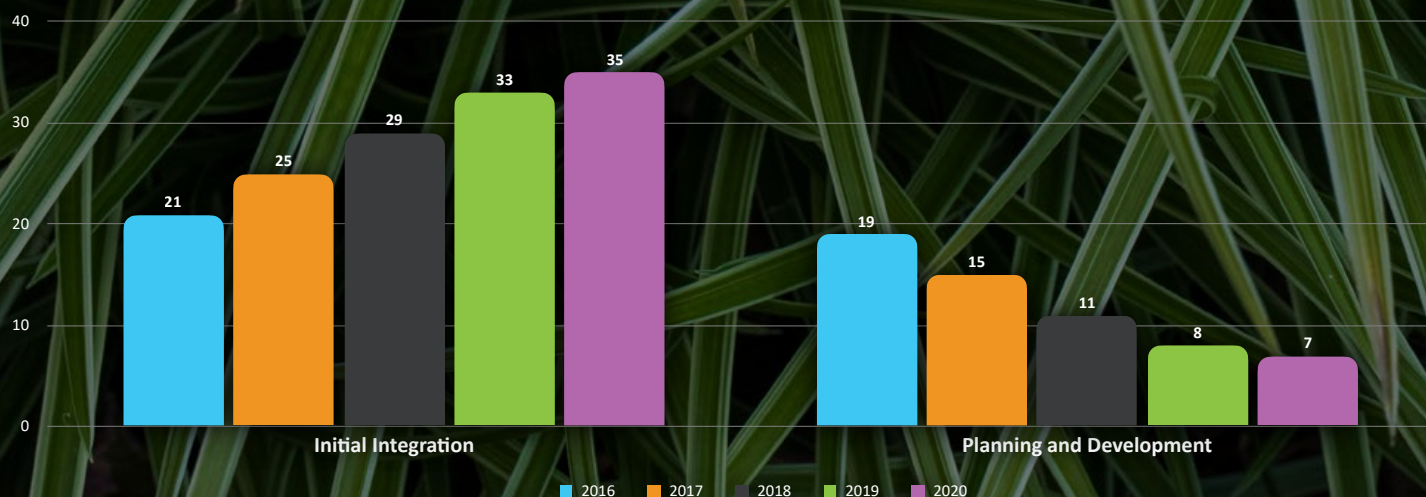
INTEGRATION TYPE

35 members have completed a total of 45 system integrations (noting that some organisations have completed more than one ORCID integration).



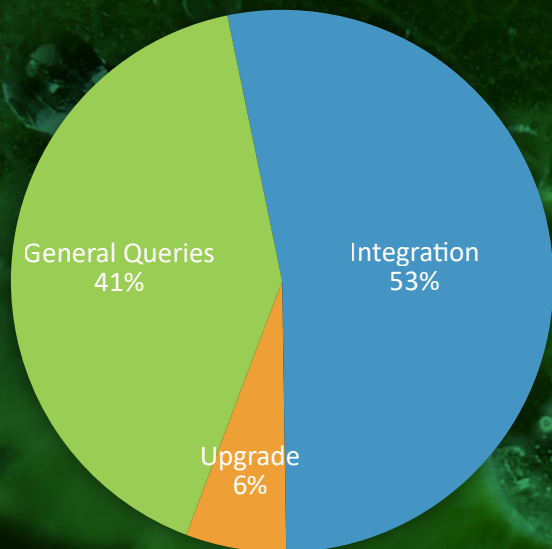
INTEGRATION STATUS

Member organisations that have completed an integration year on year (2016-2020).

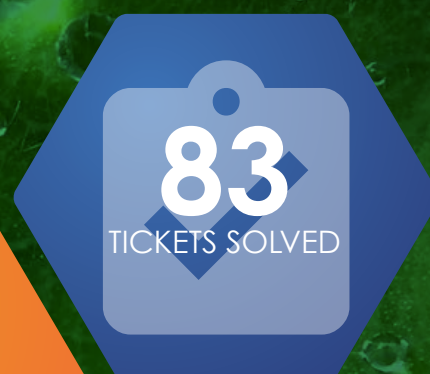


SUPPORT TICKET BREAKDOWN

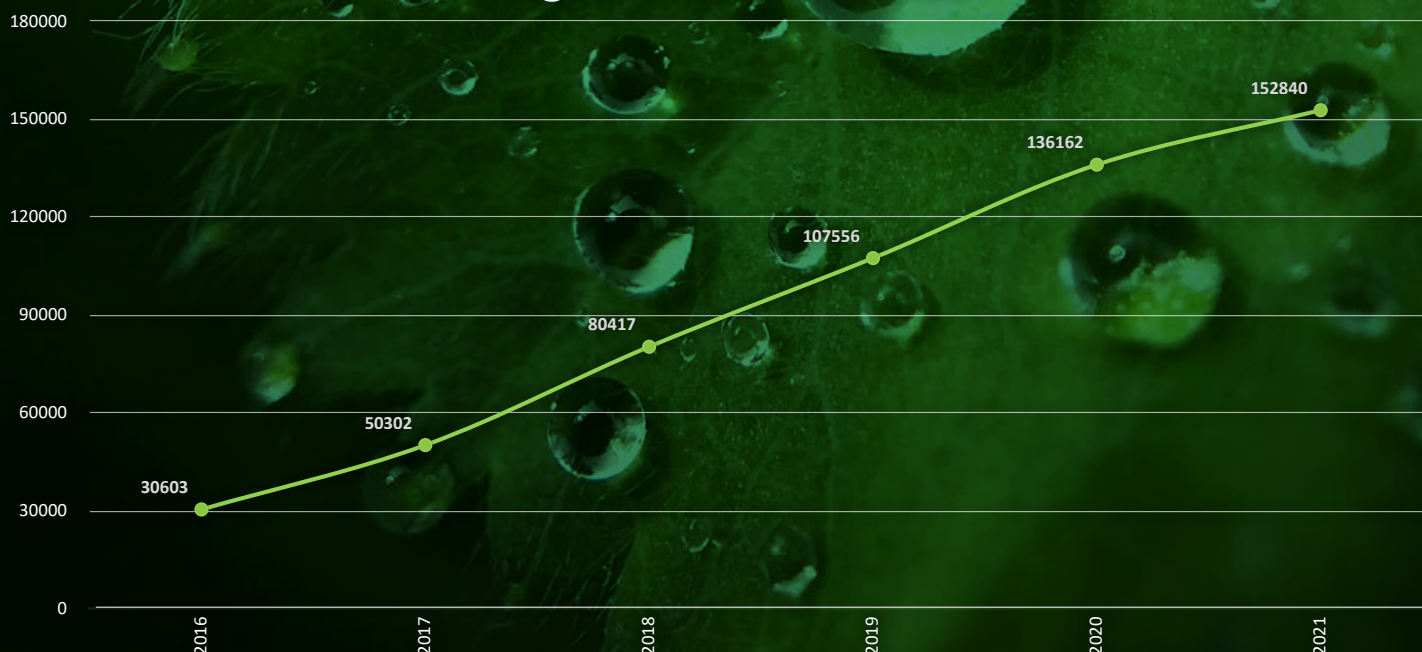
Consortium Lead Support Tickets 2020 (1 January 2020 – 31 December 2020)

ENGAGEMENT

SURVEY RESULTS

The annual ORCID member survey provides an opportunity for members to provide feedback on the Australian ORCID Consortium. This assists with the development of future consortium strategy and operational plans. 31% of members participated in the 2020 survey. Recommendations include:

- continue engagement and communication activities with members and other consortia internationally
- provide use cases and examples to educate members on the benefits of ORCID
- continue to provide training, support and consultation for members implementing and maintaining integrations.

MATURITY ASSESSMENT

In 2020 the AAF conducted a Member Maturity Assessment. This assessment was the first of its kind for any Consortium globally. The survey aimed to understand how members are using ORCID in their organisations and the level of maturity across the sector.

With a 96% response rate to the assessment, each organisation received an individual report of their ORCID integration maturity. The AAF will be conducting an analysis of the results in 2021.
